LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

Improve Health Care Access and Health Outcomes Statewide

- » Grow health professional education programs and related infrastructure to address major health workforce gaps, deliver improved access to care, and catalyze new research and health care innovation
- » Integrate clinical care, research, prevention and public health approaches to reduce prevalence of substance use disorder
- » Continue forward progress on provider reimbursement rates
- » Increase targeted provider incentives for provider recruitment, education, training and practice in New Mexico's rural and underserved areas
- » Support a flexible and adaptive health care delivery system that expands abilities of providers to be nimble and responsive to patient care needs

Contribute to a Diversified New Mexico Economy and a Well Educated, Homegrown Workforce

- » Foster community workforce collaborations that align educational programs with government and industry sectors, national labs, and a growing clean energy economy
- » Support expanded infrastructure for research, education and training programs in emerging science areas such as quantum information science and artificial intelligence
- » Grow state investments in research and tech development, advanced energy transitions, and new business development, including the Technology Enhancement Fund
- » Grow STEM-H education capacity and support improved math and literacy outcomes in the preK-12 education system
- » Support UNM infrastructure and facilities improvements that create more student-centered educational environments and promote new energy efficiencies
- » Strengthen educational pathways between New Mexico's preK-12 education system, UNM branch campuses, and UNM's **Albuquerque Campus**

Enhance Equitable Educational Access, Student **Support Services, and Campus Safety**

- » Support I&G increase, UNM RPSPs, capital requests and other targeted appropriations, including improvements to campus safety, accessibility, cybersecurity, and building and equipment renewal/replacement
- » Sustain Opportunity Scholarship and Lottery Scholarship program state investments
- » Enhance program and service inclusivity reflective of New Mexico's many unique cultural identities
- » Expand access to programs supporting student health, wellbeing and basic needs
- » Provide advocacy support to ASUNM and GPSA regarding expanded scholarship funds, program supports and new capital requests
- » Increase faculty and program endowments and expansion funds oriented toward improved student services
- » Update Lobo Athletics facilities and increase program support for student-athlete success

Improve New Mexico's National Competitiveness and **Resident Quality of Life**

- » Fully fund a minimum compensation increase of 4% for all employees, plus an additional targeted increase for faculty, and provide flexibility in the administration of compensation increases to address inequities
- » Support capital projects that attract new learners and top faculty, regionally and nationally
- » Strengthen recruitment and retention incentives for all faculty, staff and health professionals
- » Advise policies that will balance crime prevention and law enforcement with needed community support services for growing societal issues such as substance use disorders, behavioral health and criminal competency determinations
- » Support expansions of existing loan-for-service and loan repayment programs

GALLUP CAMPUS

GO Bond monies and supplemental funding in 2025 will be dedicated to new and continued renovation at UNM-Gallup to expand student services and improve learning, safety and energy efficiency in the areas of fine arts, welding, auto technology and construction.



VALENCIA CAMPUS

GO Bond monies in 2025 would allow UNM-Valencia to remodel an existing building at our Tomé campus for the purpose of creating a comprehensive presence for health-related programs, and we plan to add a health clinic that will serve the residents of rural Valencia County for low- to mid-level health care needs.



TAOS CAMPUS

UNM-Taos is collaborating with workforce partners to expand the STEM and technical workforce in northern New Mexico, creating pathways for local residents to earn family-supporting wages and contributing to sustainable energy solutions for our region.



LOS ALAMOS CAMPUS

Severance tax bond (STB) monies will be utilized at UNM-Los Alamos to upgrade our open spaces with new wayfinding, better lighting for safety and ADA compliant pathways. The project will also provide more outdoor seating, shade structures and native plants to support local species and minimize water usage.
